Dear Franklinites,

Some of you have had occasion in recent days to ask about Dean's Extensions. For the benefit of you all, I will pass along a quick guide explaining when it's appropriate to ask for a Dean's Extension, so please save this email for future reference.

First, you need to get a Dean's Extension only when your instructor asks for one. That means, you do not have to request a Dean's Extension if your instructor has already agreed to allow you to hand in work late. However, there may be instances where you are asked to obtain a Dean's Extension for purposes by which I cannot grant one. For instance, if you tell an instructor that you're going to miss a test because, say, your kid sister is competing in the US Open, and the instructor responds by saying: "No problem. Just bring me a Dean's Extension." Unfortunately, that request will not be granted (though I'd join in your excitement) because it falls outside of the scope of Dean's Extensions, and I'll outline the categories for extensions below.

Before I list when Dean's Extensions will be granted, here's where they won't:

Absences:

Dean's Extensions revise coursework deadlines or test dates in certain, narrowly defined circumstances. In some cases, your instructor will ask you to get an excuse to cover an absence, for example a language class where attendance counts towards your grade. This is usually a scenario where you must work out directly with your instructor how and/or if your absence will affect your grade (and it very well may). In this situation, there is absolutely no role for a Dean's Extension. If your instructor has questions about this policy, you should refer them to the YCPS and me.

Work overload:

It's bound to happen, because you're a Yalie: you're going to get swamped with work, especially during midterm and the end of the semester. Again, there's no role for a Dean's Extension here. If you haven't done so already, you need to start planning for peaks in your workload now. Good tip: plot all your course syllabi on a single calendar. If reviewing the result completely freaks you out, come see me.

Extracurricular activities (including job and fellowship interviews):

Snag a lead role in a Drama show? Pressed into bitter servitude by an acapella group? Going to a medical school, job, or internship interview? Tremendous! You can ask your instructor for an extension for late work, but not me: a Dean's Extension cannot be offered for such reasons.

Okay, so when do you come to see me for a Dean's Extension?

There are five situations:

- 1. DEATH IN THE FAMILY: Contact your instructor and see me immediately.
- 2. INCAPACITATING ILLNESS or INCAPACITATING CONDITION: By definition, an incapacitating illness requires immediate medical attention. Your health should be your first priority, not your schoolwork. After you've seen someone at Yale Health, come see me as soon as possible to reschedule the work you missed. Timeliness matters: I want to hear from you as soon as you are reasonably able.
- 3. A COMPARABLE EMERGENCY: Specifically, an emergency comparable to either the death of a family member or an incapacitating illness. Aunt Betty's birthday? No. Computer crash? No. Job interview? Unfortunately, no.
- 4. VARSITY COMPETITION REQUIRING TRAVEL FROM CAMPUS: If you are a varsity athlete who is expected to represent Yale at a competition and you have to miss a test or deadline because of it, please be in touch well in advance of the event.
- 5. OBSERVANCE OF RELIGIOUS HOLY DAYS: If you have to take a test or hand in work on a religious holy day, please be in touch.

One last bit of information. Instructors can grant extensions any time during the term on their own authority, but **everything changes at the end of the term**. I'll send you more information about such situations later on.

I hope you will have minimal need for a Dean's Extension, but if you do, now you know how they work.







Yale Degree Audit

Yale Degree Audit is a web-based tool that calculates and displays how an individual student's courses may count toward the requirements for the bachelor's degree. The degree audit enables students to monitor their own progress toward the completion of degree requirements. It also helps students, and their advisers discuss course selection for current and future terms more meaningfully by clarifying what requirements the student still needs to complete. Currently, major requirements are not included in the audit. Log into Yale Hub to pull up your audit.

Unlike a transcript, your degree audit is an unofficial document provided for your information and convenience. The audit serves as a tool to provide you with helpful and timely information when you are planning your course schedule, discussing your schedule with your adviser, and reviewing your progress toward completing the requirements for the bachelor's degree. Your degree audit is **not** an official academic transcript.

Yale Degree Audit will help you:

- Determine what requirements you need to fulfill in order to complete your bachelor's degree.
- View a list of all courses in which you have enrolled and the distributional designations each course carries.
- View individual course grades and cumulative grade-point average (GPA)
