Sept 19: Last day to withdraw from a course offered in the first half of the fall term without the course appearing on the transcript. See <u>Withdrawal from Courses</u> and <u>Grades</u>. Last day to convert from a letter grade to the Credit/D/Fail option in a course offered in the first half of the fall term. See <u>Grades</u>.

Sept 21: Withdrawal from Yale College on or before this date entitles a student to a rebate of one-half of fall-term tuition. See *Undergraduate Regulations*.

Oct 4: Last day to withdraw from a course offered in the first half of the term. See <u>Withdrawal from Courses</u> and <u>Grades</u>.

Oct 14: Classes begin for courses offered in the second half of the fall term.

Oct 15: October recess begins, 11 p.m. Deadline to apply for a spring 2020 Term Abroad. See <u>Special Arrangements</u>.

Oct 21: Classes resume, 8:20 a.m.

Oct 25: Midterm.; Last day to withdraw from a fall full-term course without the course appearing on the transcript. See Withdrawal from Courses and Grades. Last day to convert from a letter grade to the Credit/D/Fail option in a fall full-term course. Deadline to apply for double credit in a single-credit course. See Special Arrangements. Withdrawal from Yale College on or before this date entitles a student to a rebate of one-quarter of the fall term's tuition. See Undergraduate Regulations.

Nov 7: Last day to withdraw from a course offered in the second half of the fall term without the course appearing on the transcript. See <u>Withdrawal from Courses</u> and <u>Grades</u>. Last day to convert from a letter grade to Credit/D/Fail option in a course offered in the second half of the fall term. See <u>Grades</u>.

Nov 23: November recess begins, 9 p. m.

Nov 30: Last day to relinquish on-campus housing for the spring term without charge. See *Undergraduate Regulations*.

Dec 6: Classes end, 5:30 p.m. reading period begins. Last day to withdraw from a fall full-term course offered in the second half of the fall term. See <u>Withdrawal from Courses</u> and <u>Grades</u>.

Dec 12: Reading period ends, 5 p.m., Final examinations begin, 7 p. m. Deadline for all course assignments, other than term papers and term projects. The deadline can be extended only by a Temporary Incomplete authorized by Dean Hill.

Yale Degree Audit

Yale Degree Audit (YDA) is a tool that tracks your progress toward the bachelor's degree. YDA is located on the Academics tab of Student Information System (SIS). YDA displays the Yale College degree requirements that you have already completed and those that are still pending. A "Look Ahead" feature shows you how future course enrollment might apply toward your degree. Yale Degree Audit does not take the place of face-to-face advising, although you may wish to share your audit with your adviser. Instead, it provides an easy-to-read summary of requirements, allowing you and your adviser to spend more time discussing course selection and academic goals.

Do not rely solely on your degree audit when planning your courses; continue to use Yale's standard systems for schedule planning and employ YDA as an additional tool. More features will be added to YDA in the future, including the ability to track progress toward major requirements.

Financial assistance covers **50**% of the tuition of one course. Students may receive financial assistance for a maximum of two credits each summer. Some courses also include all-expenses-paid trips to museums, neighboring cities, and events.


