CALENDAR AT A GLANCE

Apr 26: Classes end, 5:30 p.m.; reading period begins. Last day to withdraw from a spring full-term course or a course offered in the second half of the spring term. See <u>Withdrawal from Courses</u> and Grades.

Yale Degree Audit

Yale Degree Audit (YDA) is a tool that tracks your progress toward the bachelor's degree. YDA is located on the Academics tab of Student Information System (SIS). YDA displays the Yale College degree requirements that you have already completed and those that are still pending. A "Look Ahead" feature shows you how future course enrollment might apply toward your degree. Yale Degree Audit does not take the place of face-to-face advising, although you may wish to share your audit with your adviser. Instead, it provides an easy-to-read summary of requirements, allowing you and your adviser to spend more time discussing course selection and academic goals.

Do not rely solely on your degree audit when planning your courses; continue to use Yale's standard systems for schedule planning and employ YDA as an additional tool. More features will be added to YDA in the future, including the ability to track progress toward major requirements.

The Yale College Public Speaking Competition

Dear Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors,

Are you a great public speaker? Do you want to practice and improve your public speaking skills? If so, sign up for the Yale College Public Speaking Competition. There are separate competitions for sophomores, juniors, and seniors, and prizes of \$1,000, \$500, and \$250 are awarded in each category. If you are interested in competing, fill out the <u>application form</u>. **The deadline for submission is Friday, April 19, at 11.59 p.m. EDT.**

The competition will take place on Monday, April 29 in room 410 Sterling Tower (SSS), 1 Prospect Street. Applicants will be assigned to a block of time in the late morning or afternoon and must be available for that entire time block which is generally 1-2 hours long. All speeches must be original works created by the student, and they must be delivered from notes or recited from memory. They must be between 5-8 minutes long; longer or shorter speeches will be disqualified. Rules, based on the terms of the endowments that fund them, are listed below:

The Buck-Jackson Prize: Awarded to a sophomore for the best original oration on a subject of a patriotic nature. [Note that this does not need to be on an American subject].

The Henry James TenEyck Prize: Awarded to orators among the junior class on a subject of the speaker's choice.

The David C. DeForest Prize & Townsend Premiums: For the senior[s] "who shall write and pronounce an English oration in the best manner." [Note that there are no special requirements for an "English oration".]

Prize winners will be notified by email on or before May 3. You may view the full list of prize winners <u>here</u>.
